helping relationships with older adults from theory to practice examines the fundamental theoretical perspectives of the aging process with an emphasis on the healthy aspects of aging taking a comprehensive approach author adele williams addresses various therapeutic methods as she highlights the strengths and resiliency of the older population exercises and case studies demonstrate key concepts and promote skill development by allowing students to experience the various challenges in the lives of older clients with a rapidly aging population throughout the world the issue of larger percentages of older adults has repercussions for both policy and the job market whether a university student about to seek a full time job or a caregiver for an older person aging in the family should enhance the reader's knowledge and skills the main topics covered in this volume include marital status of older adults support systems within families crises with older adults within families the resilience of older adults entering the latter stages of life practical information involving caregiving aging in place and various social services for an aging population the reader will be made aware of intergenerational interactions between older adults and other family members in various cultures the role of ethnicity and socio economic status in health issues of older adults will be discussed as will the application of technology to an aging population though problems certainly exist as one ages the overall thrust of the book is toward the positive aspects of growing old numerous theories exist to probe research and understanding of older adults in families the relation between theory and research will be helpful to many students of aging in the family older adults are generally married yet cohabitation and other options are alive and well too ageism death and abuse unfortunately are issues affecting aging yet most older adults in the us and western europe report living independently and being satisfied with their lives aging in the family will be an interesting read for anyone wanting to learn about older adults and family relationships as it exhibits a blend of both theoretical and practical matters as the first of the nation's 78 million baby boomers begin reaching age 65 in 2011 they will face a health care workforce that is too small and woefully unprepared to meet their specific health needs retooling for an aging america calls for bold initiatives starting immediately to train all health care providers in the basics of geriatric care and to prepare family members and other informal caregivers who currently receive little or no training in how to tend to their aging loved ones the book also recommends that medicare medicaid and other health plans pay higher rates to boost recruitment and retention of geriatric specialists and care aides educators and health professional groups can use retooling for an aging america to institute or increase formal education and training in geriatrics consumer groups can use the book to advocate for improving the care for older adults health care professional and occupational groups can use it to improve the quality of health care jobs social isolation and loneliness are serious yet underappreciated public health risks that affect a significant portion of the older adult population approximately one quarter of community

dwelling americans aged 65 and older are considered to be socially isolated and a significant proportion of adults in the united states report feeling lonely people who are 50 years of age or older are more likely to experience many of the risk factors that can cause or exacerbate social isolation or loneliness such as living alone the loss of family or friends chronic illness and sensory impairments over a life course social isolation and loneliness may be episodic or chronic depending upon an individual's circumstances and perceptions a substantial body of evidence demonstrates that social isolation presents a major risk for premature mortality comparable to other risk factors such as high blood pressure smoking or obesity as older adults are particularly high volume and high frequency users of the health care system there is an opportunity for health care professionals to identify prevent and mitigate the adverse health impacts of social isolation and loneliness in older adults social isolation and loneliness in older adults summarizes the evidence base and explores how social isolation and loneliness affect health and quality of life in adults aged 50 and older particularly among low income underserved and vulnerable populations this report makes recommendations specifically for clinical settings of health care to identify those who suffer the resultant negative health impacts of social isolation and loneliness and target interventions to improve their social conditions social isolation and loneliness in older adults considers clinical tools and methodologies better education and training for the health care workforce and dissemination and implementation that will be important for translating research into practice especially as the evidence base for effective interventions continues to flourish family caregiving affects millions of americans every day in all walks of life at least 17.7 million individuals in the united states are caregivers of an older adult with a health or functional limitation the nation's family caregivers provide the lion's share of long term care for our older adult population they are also central to older adults access to and receipt of health care and community based social services yet the need to recognize and support caregivers is among the least appreciated challenges facing the aging us population families caring for an aging america examines the prevalence and nature of family caregiving of older adults and the available evidence on the effectiveness of programs supports and other interventions designed to support family caregivers this report also assesses and recommends policies to address the needs of family caregivers and to minimize the barriers that they encounter in trying to meet the needs of older adults this book explores the meaning of quality of life in care for older persons and introduces the reader to their main concerns when receiving care based on qualitative research it pays particular attention to the needs and requirements of older people considering their individual family situations social circumstances values and lifestyles person centred care is a way of providing nursing care that puts older people and their families at the core of all decisions seeing each person as an individual and working together to develop appropriate solutions following an introduction to the concept of quality of life in old age the book reviews essential findings from worldwide research into the experiences of older people with regard to nursing care and the impact of these experiences on their quality of life it investigates health promotion care provided in nursing homes and assisted living facilities and palliative care each chapter includes a brief introduction to the respective field of nursing care and the problems it has to deal with concluding with a discussion of their implications for nursing practice in the respective field of care in closing the evidence from qualitative research is discussed in relation to current gerontological theories a comprehensive guide to late life anxiety for all mental health workers covering recent research and evolving techniques and strategies the book features real life vignettes that bring the text to life providing readers with the opportunity to see how older adults benefit from senior centers the appendix includes a useful list of resources as well professionals who work with older adults including social workers recreation therapists nurses gerontologists administrators and students will find this book to be a valuable resource the book features real life vignettes that bring the text to life providing readers with the opportunity to see how older adults benefit from senior centers the appendix includes a useful list of resources as well professionals who work with older adults including social workers recreation therapists nurses gerontologists administrators and students will find this book to

concerns dr storlie advocates adoption of an evidence based person centered approach to communication the benefits of person centered communication are many they can increase older adult satisfaction with provider services enhance mutual respect and understanding improve accuracy of information exchanged positively impact service outcomes increase compliance with provider recommendations and reduce the frustration and stress often experienced by both provider and older adult rare to this genre readers are introduced to several under explored topics within the field of communication along with methods for applying concepts from research findings into these topics to enhance the quality of interpersonal communication topics include the role of mental imagery in the communication process the influence of neurocardiology on relationships and controversial findings from research into quantum physics the book concludes by highlighting progress made in narrowing the interpersonal communication gap and forecasts how communications oriented technological advances might improve quality of life for 21st century older adults and the providers who serve them utilizing interdisciplinary case studies to illustrate common problematic situations this book provides detailed exercises that explain how providers can integrate person centered communication into their practices to improve provider older adult interactions written in a style designed to maximize learning it helps providers find the information they need understand what they read and apply what they the elderly the actively aging framework takes into account health social behavioral economic and personal factors as they relate to aging but also explores environmental issues which aligns with the new educational standards put forth by the council on social work education covering micro mezzo and macro practice domains the text examines all aspects of working with aging populations from assessment through termination this book is an attempt to advance the discussion and improve our understanding about the

effects of aging and movement disorders on motor control during walking and postural tasks despite these activities are performed daily there is a high requirement of motor and neural systems in order to perform both tasks efficiently both walking and posture require a complex interaction of musculoskeletal and neural systems however the mechanisms used to control these tasks as well as how they are planned and coordinated are still a question of discussion among health professionals and researchers in addition this discussion is more interesting when the effects of aging are included in the context of locomotion and the postural control the number of older individuals is 841 million in 2015 which is four times higher than the 202 million that lived in 1950 aging causes many motor sensorial and neural deficits which impair locomotion and postural control in the elderly the severity of this framework is worsened when the aging goes along with a movement disorder such as parkinson disease chorea dystonia huntington disease etc therefore the aim of this book is to highlight the influence of different aspects on planning controlling and performing locomotion and posture tasks in attempting to improve current knowledge in this field invited authors present and discuss how environmental sensorial motor cognitive and individual aspects influence the planning and performance of locomotor and postural activities the major thrust of the book is to address the mechanisms involved in controlling and planning motor action in neurological healthy individuals as well as in those who suffer from movement disorders or face the effects of aging indicating the aspects that impair locomotion and postural control in addition new technologies tools and interventions designed to manage the effects of aging and movement disorders are presented in the book at least 5 6 million to 8 million nearly one in five older adults in america have one or more mental health and substance use conditions which present unique challenges for their care with the number of adults age 65 and older projected to soar from 40 3 million in 2010 to 72 1 million by 2030 the aging of america holds profound consequences for the nation for decades policymakers have been warned that the nation s health care workforce is ill equipped to care for a rapidly growing and increasingly diverse population in the specific disciplines of mental health and substance use there have been similar warnings about serious workforce shortages insufficient workforce diversity and lack of basic competence and core knowledge in key areas following its 2008 report highlighting the urgency of expanding and strengthening the geriatric health care workforce the iom was asked by the department of health and human services to undertake a complementary study on the geriatric mental health and substance use workforce the mental health and substance use workforce for older adults in whose hands assesses the needs of this population and the workforce that serves it the breadth and magnitude of inadequate workforce training and personnel shortages have grown to such proportions says the committee that no single approach nor a few isolated changes in disparate federal agencies or programs can adequately address the issue overcoming these challenges will require focused and coordinated action by all simple yet key approaches to therapeutic work with the aged are often overlooked in favor of addressing pathology and determining treatment plans this book fills the gap by explaining the overarching strategies including how to avoid ageism and other common pitfalls and how to promote age related strengths essential to effective therapy with elderly clients a practical guide to bridging the generation gap in how to say it to seniors geriatric psychology expert david solie offers help in removing the typical communication blocks many experience with the elderly by sharing his insights into the later stages of life solie helps in understanding the unique perspective of seniors and provides the tools to relate to them society as a whole is getting older thanks to the extraordinary advances in technology and medicine humans are now living longer than ever before and are shifting the demographic make up on a worldwide scale as a result more and more of us are living and engaging with an aging population in both our personal and professional lives and there s a heightened demand for concrete research and advice on how to effectively provide care for this growing demographic the care of the older brings together some of today s most experienced geriatric researchers to provide concrete answers for care providers of all kinds doctors nurses therapists nursing home workers and spouses and children of elderly who are spending more and more time working with our aging population the care for the older person is broken up into 23 chapters written by an esteemed group of doctors and researchers each covering a different aspect of elder care the authors of this volume take as their starting point striking moments in their practice with older

opportunities in the age of health care reform provides an introduction to the principles of palliative care describes current models of delivering palliative care across care settings and examines opportunities in the setting of healthcare policy reform for palliative care to improve outcomes for patients families and healthcare institutions the united states is currently facing a crisis in health care marked by unsustainable spending and quality that is poor relative to international benchmarks yet this is also a critical time of opportunity because of its focus on quality of care the affordable care act is poised to expand access to palliative care services for the sickest most vulnerable and therefore most costly 5% of patients a small group who nonetheless drive about 50% of all healthcare spending palliative care is specialized medical care for people with serious illnesses it focuses on providing patients with relief from the symptoms pain and stress of a serious illness whatever the diagnosis or stage of illness the goal is to improve quality of life for both the patient and the family research has demonstrated palliative care's positive impact on health care value patients and family caregivers receiving palliative care experience improved quality of life better symptom management lower rates of depression and anxiety and improved survival because patient and family needs are met crises are prevented thereby directly reducing need for emergency department and hospital use and their associated costs an epiphenomenon of better quality of care the lower costs associated with palliative care have been observed in multiple studies meeting the needs of older adults with serious illness challenges and opportunities in the age of health care reform a roadmap for effective policy and program design brings together expert clinicians researchers and policy leaders who tackle key areas where real world policy options to improve access to quality palliative care could have a substantial role in improving value the meaning and value of reminiscence in the lives of elders is beautifully explored a journey called aging presents an insightful exploration of the years between the entry into older adulthood and death this text examines the significant changes and major landmarks of older persons between 60 and 90 grounded by a developmental framework based on empirical research this book presents a new way of looking at older adulthood describing the older adult years in intensely human terms through both anecdotes and research based findings to engage the reader as both guide and traveler using a series of sequential stages as a framework a journey called aging discusses the experiences of older adults addressing the challenges and opportunities presented at each stage this clear analysis can be used as a guide to help persons plan their own odyssey through the older years topics in a journey called aging include research and results of the study entering older adulthood the long stable stage of extended middle age early transition older adult lifestyle later transition the stable stage near the end of life the final transition a journey called aging is crucial reading for professionals who work with older adults including pastors attorneys facilities managers and program directors gerontology educators and students and older adults themselves their families and those who care for and about them authoritative comprehensive holistic and highly illustrated the caregiver's encyclopedia will help you figure out how to be the best caregiver you can be first published in 1999 routledge is an imprint of taylor francis an informa company
